COURSE DESCRIPTION

Morality is the study of right and wrong. Sociology cannot tell us what is right or wrong, but it can tell how social groups respond to what they define as right and wrong. Morality in this sense is a behavioral phenomenon, known by how people manage conflict.

This course reviews the sociology of morality. Adopting a theoretical perspective known as pure sociology, it addresses the main varieties of conflict management, including law, violence, avoidance, therapy, and toleration. While the course focuses disproportionately on the moral practices of modern Americans it also draws liberally on historical and anthropological accounts of disputing in earlier and structurally simpler societies.

By the end of the course, you should be able to:

- State clearly the difference between a sociological and a philosophical approach to morality.
- Articulate the main forms of conflict management found in human societies.
- Understand the core features of pure sociology.
- Apply the principles of pure sociology to any conflict.

READINGS

There are no assigned textbooks. The required reading consists of a packet of materials on E-reserve at the Library. To access the articles, go to the Library web site (at the very bottom of the UGA home page) and click on “Gil Catalog.” Under “Resources” click on “Course Reserves.” Click on “Search Course Reserves” and under “Course” scroll to “Soci 4800.” The **password** is: **morality**.

It is best to read the readings before the lectures. I will tell you in class what you need to read for the upcoming classes.

ORAL PRESENTATION

You will each be required to make a short, oral presentation in class about a conflict that you have read or heard about or been involved in. The presentation must be accompanied by a brief, one-page written description of the social structure or geometry of the conflict.

The presentations will begin after the first test and continue on until the end of the semester. Two students will present per class.

PAPER

You will be required to write a paper (10-page maximum) on a conflict (different from the one you presented orally) or series of conflicts. You must describe in detail the grounds of the conflict, its social geometry, and analyze whether the outcome is consistent with the theory we have been using throughout the semester. Alternatively, you can select a social setting and analyze the dominant form or forms of conflict found therein, again with a view to determining whether the empirical patterns conform to theoretical expectations.
